Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

BASIC CITY COUNCIL MEETING RULES

<u>AGENDAS</u> - The City Council meets Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 A.M. The agendas for City Council meetings contain a brief general description of those items to be considered at the meetings. Council Agendas are available in the Office of the City Clerk, Council and Public Services Division, Room 395, City Hall, 200 North Spring Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, and on the City's website at lacity.gov or lacouncilcalendar.com.

Ten (10) members of the Council constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Council may consider an item not listed on the agenda only if it is determined by a two-thirds (10) vote that the need for action arose after the posting of an Agenda. Some items on the agenda may be approved without any discussion, however, any item may be called "special" by a Councilmember. If an item is called "special" it will be "held" until the remainder of the items on the Council agenda have been acted on by the Council. An item may also be called "special" if a member of the public has requested to speak on the item and a public hearing was not previously held.

The City Clerk will announce the items to be considered by the Council, however items will be grouped. For example, all items for which required public hearings have not previously been held are listed in one section on the printed agenda. The Council President will ask if any Councilmember or member or the public wishes to speak on one or more of these items. If anyone wishes to speak on an item, it will be called "special". The remaining items in this section will be voted on by Council with one roll call vote.

<u>PUBLIC INPUT AT CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS</u> - An opportunity for the public to address the Council on agenda items for which public hearings have not been held will be provided at the time the item is considered or during the Multiple Agenda Item Comment period. Members of the public who wish to speak on items shall be allowed to speak for up to one minute per item up to a total of three minutes per meeting. The Council has determined that a cumulative total of 20 minutes is a reasonable minimum amount of time for the Multiple Agenda Item segment of each regular meeting.

The Council will also provide an opportunity for the public to speak on public interest items. Each speaker shall be limited to one minute of general public comment each regular meeting for a cumulative total of ten (10) minutes. The Council shall not discuss or take action relative to any general public comment.

If you wish to provide documents to the full Council for consideration on an item, please present the Sergeant-At-Arms with 35 copies. Otherwise, your materials will simply be added to the official record.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION AND TIME LIMITS - Councilmembers requesting to address the Council will be recognized by the Council President in the order requested. For any item, the Chairperson of the Committee, or the maker of the original motion, or the member calling a matter "special" shall have up to six (6) minutes to discuss the item. All other Councilmembers may speak up to three (3) minutes each on the matter. After all members desiring to speak on a question have had an opportunity to be heard once, the time for each Member desiring to speak again shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) minutes.

A motion calling the "previous question" may be introduced by any member during a Council debate. If adopted, this motion will terminate debate on a matter and the Chair will instruct the Clerk to call the roll on the matter.

<u>VOTING AND DISPOSITION OF ITEMS</u> - Most items require a majority vote of the entire membership of the Council (8 members). Items which have not been discussed in a Council Committee and have been placed directly on the agenda will require 10 votes to consider. Once considered, these items will normally require eight (8) affirmative votes to be adopted. Ordinances require a unanimous vote (at least 12 members must be present) in order to be adopted on first consideration. If

an ordinance does not receive the necessary unanimous vote, it is laid over one calendar week. The votes required for approval on second consideration vary and depend upon the type of ordinance, but a typical ordinance requires eight (8) affirmative votes upon second consideration.

NOTICE TO PAID REPRESENTATIVES - If you are compensated to monitor, attend, or speak at this meeting, City law may require you to register as a lobbyist and report your activity. See Los Angeles Municipal Code 48.01 et seq. More information is available at ethics.lacity.org/lobbying. For assistance, please contact the Ethics Commission at (213) 978-1960 or ethics.commission@lacity.org.

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When debate on an item is completed, the Chair will instruct the Clerk to "call the roll". Every member present must vote for or against each item; abstentions are not permitted. The Clerk will announce the votes on each item. Any member of Council may move to "reconsider" any vote on any item on the agenda, except to adjourn, suspend the Rules, or where an intervening event has deprived the Council of jurisdiction, providing that said member originally voted on the prevailing side of the item. The motion to "reconsider" shall only be in order once during the meeting, and once during the next regular meeting. The member requesting reconsideration shall identify for all members present the agenda number, Council file number and subject matter previously voted upon. A motion to reconsider is not debatable and shall require an affirmative vote of eight (8) members of the Council.

When the Council has failed by sufficient votes to approve or reject an item, and has not lost jurisdiction over the matter, or has not caused it to be continued beyond the next regular meeting, the item is continued to the next regular meeting for the purpose of allowing the Council to again vote on the matter.

The City Council rules provide that all items adopted by the Council will not be presented to the Mayor, or other designated officer by the City Clerk until the adjournment of the regular Council meeting following the date of the Council action. A motion to send an item "forthwith" if adopted by ten (10) votes, suspends these rules and requires the City Clerk to forward the matter to the Mayor, or other officer, without delay.

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RULE 16 MOTIONS - Council Rule No. 16, in part, allows a member to send an item directly to the Council without it having to go to a Council Committee first, by giving the City Clerk a motion (seconded by an additional member) during a Council session to be placed on the next regular available Council agenda.

Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

BASIC CITY COUNCIL MEETING RULES

<u>AGENDAS</u> - The City Council meets Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 A.M. The agendas for City Council meetings contain a brief general description of those items to be considered at the meetings. Council Agendas are available in the Office of the City Clerk, Council and Public Services Division, Room 395, City Hall, 200 North Spring Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, and on the City's website at lacity.gov or lacouncilcalendar.com.

Ten (10) members of the Council constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Council may consider an item not listed on the agenda only if it is determined by a two-thirds (10) vote that the need for action arose after the posting of an Agenda. Some items on the agenda may be approved without any discussion, however, any item may be called "special" by a Councilmember. If an item is called "special" it will be "held" until the remainder of the items on the Council agenda have been acted on by the Council. An item may also be called "special" if a member of the public has requested to speak on the item and a public hearing was not previously held.

The City Clerk will announce the items to be considered by the Council, however items will be grouped. For example, all items for which required public hearings have not previously been held are listed in one section on the printed agenda. The Council President will ask if any Councilmember or member or the public wishes to speak on one or more of these items. If anyone wishes to speak on an item, it will be called "special". The remaining items in this section will be voted on by Council with one roll call vote.

<u>PUBLIC INPUT AT CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS</u> - An opportunity for the public to address the Council on agenda items for which public hearings have not been held will be provided at the time the item is considered or during the Multiple Agenda Item Comment period. Members of the public who wish to speak on items shall be allowed to speak for up to one minute per item up to a total of three minutes per meeting. The Council has determined that a cumulative total of 20 minutes is a reasonable minimum amount of time for the Multiple Agenda Item segment of each regular meeting.

The Council will also provide an opportunity for the public to speak on public interest items. Each speaker shall be limited to one minute of general public comment each regular meeting for a cumulative total of ten (10) minutes. The Council shall not discuss or take action relative to any general public comment.

If you wish to provide documents to the full Council for consideration on an item, please present the Sergeant-At-Arms with 35 copies. Otherwise, your materials will simply be added to the official record.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION AND TIME LIMITS - Councilmembers requesting to address the Council will be recognized by the Council President in the order requested. For any item, the Chairperson of the Committee, or the maker of the original motion, or the member calling a matter "special" shall have up to six (6) minutes to discuss the item. All other Councilmembers may speak up to three (3) minutes each on the matter. After all members desiring to speak on a question have had an opportunity to be heard once, the time for each Member desiring to speak again shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) minutes.

A motion calling the "previous question" may be introduced by any member during a Council debate. If adopted, this motion will terminate debate on a matter and the Chair will instruct the Clerk to call the roll on the matter.

<u>VOTING AND DISPOSITION OF ITEMS</u> - Most items require a majority vote of the entire membership of the Council (8 members). Items which have not been discussed in a Council Committee and have been placed directly on the agenda will require 10 votes to consider. Once considered, these items will normally require eight (8) affirmative votes to be adopted. Ordinances require a unanimous vote (at least 12 members must be present) in order to be adopted on first consideration. If

an ordinance does not receive the necessary unanimous vote, it is laid over one calendar week. The votes required for approval on second consideration vary and depend upon the type of ordinance, but a typical ordinance requires eight (8) affirmative votes upon second consideration.

NOTICE TO PAID REPRESENTATIVES - If you are compensated to monitor, attend, or speak at this meeting, City law may require you to register as a lobbyist and report your activity. See Los Angeles Municipal Code 48.01 et seq. More information is available at ethics.lacity.org/lobbying. 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When debate on an item is completed, the Chair will instruct the Clerk to "call the roll". Every member present must vote for or against each item; abstentions are not permitted. The Clerk will announce the votes on each item. Any member of Council may move to "reconsider" any vote on any item on the agenda, except to adjourn, suspend the Rules, or where an intervening event has deprived the Council of jurisdiction, providing that said member originally voted on the prevailing side of the item. The motion to "reconsider" shall only be in order once during the meeting, and once during the next regular meeting. The member requesting reconsideration shall identify for all members present the agenda number, Council file number and subject matter previously voted upon. A motion to reconsider is not debatable and shall require an affirmative vote of eight (8) members of the Council.

When the Council has failed by sufficient votes to approve or reject an item, and has not lost jurisdiction over the matter, or has not caused it to be continued beyond the next regular meeting, the item is continued to the next regular meeting for the purpose of allowing the Council to again vote on the matter.

The City Council rules provide that all items adopted by the Council will not be presented to the Mayor, or other designated officer by the City Clerk until the adjournment of the regular Council meeting following the date of the Council action. A motion to send an item "forthwith" if adopted by ten (10) votes, suspends these rules and requires the City Clerk to forward the matter to the Mayor, or other officer, without delay.

When debate on an item is completed, the Chair will instruct the Clerk to "call the roll". Every member present must vote for or against each item; abstentions are not permitted. The Clerk will announce the votes on each item. Any member of Council may move to "reconsider" any vote on any item on the agenda, except to adjourn, suspend the Rules, or where an

intervening event has deprived the Council of jurisdiction, providing that said member originally voted on the prevailing side of the item. The motion to "reconsider" shall only be in order once during the meeting, and once during the next regular meeting. The member requesting reconsideration shall identify for all members present the agenda number, Council file number and subject matter previously voted upon. A motion to reconsider is not debatable and shall require an affirmative vote of eight (8) members of the Council.

When the Council has failed by sufficient votes to approve or reject an item, and has not lost jurisdiction over the matter, or has not caused it to be continued beyond the next regular meeting, the item is continued to the next regular meeting for the purpose of allowing the Council to again vote on the matter.

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RULE 16 MOTIONS - Council Rule No. 16, in part, allows a member to send an item directly to the Council without it having to go to a Council Committee first, by giving the City Clerk a motion (seconded by an additional member) during a Council session to be placed on the next regular available Council agenda.

WHEREAS, AMDA Inc., a New York not-for-profit corporation and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Borrower"), has requested that the California Municipal Finance Authority (the "Authority") issue revenue bonds in one or more series from time to time pursuant to a plan of financing in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$40,000,000 (the "Bonds") for the purpose of (i) financing certain new money projects as described below (the "New Money Projects"), (ii) refinancing all or a portion of the California Municipal Finance Authority Revenue Bonds (AMDA, Inc. WHEREAS, the Projects will be used for educational purposes of the Borrower, and will be owned and operated by, and used by, the Borrower;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority must be approved by the City because the Projects are located within the territorial limits of the City;

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "City Council") is the elected legislative body of the City and is one of the "applicable elected representatives" required to approve the issuance of the Bonds under Section 147(f) of the Code;

WHEREAS, the Authority has requested that the City Council approve the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority in order to satisfy the public approval requirement of Section 147(f) of the Code and the requirements of Section 4 of the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement Relating to the California Municipal Finance Authority, dated as of January 1, 2004 (the "Agreement"), among certain local agencies, including the City; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Code, the City Council has, following notice duly given, held a public hearing regarding the issuance of the Bonds, and now desires to approve the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Los Angeles as follows:

The foregoing resolutions are true and correct.

The City Council hereby approves the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority. It is the purpose and intent of the City Council that this Resolution constitute approval of the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority, for the purposes of (a) Section 147(f) of the Code by the applicable elected representative of the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the Project is to be located, in accordance with said Section 147(f) and (b) Section 4 of the Agreement.

The officers of the City are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents which they deem necessary or advisable in order to carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution and the financing transaction approved hereby.

The City Council expressly conditions its approval of this Resolution on its understanding that the City shall have no obligation whatsoever to pay any principal, interest, fees or any other costs associated with the Authority's issuance of the Bonds for the financing and/or refinancing of the Projects.

Neither the faith and credit nor taxing power of the City, the State of California or any political subdivision thereof, will be pledged to the payment of the principal or redemption premium, if any, or interest on the Bonds. The issuance of the Bonds will not directly, indirectly or contingently obligate the City, the State of California or any political subdivision thereof to levy or to pledge any form of taxation or to make any appropriation for their payment.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

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The Los Angeles City/County Native American Indian Commission was officially established by the County of Los Angeles on June 25. 1976. The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors then established the Commission via Ordinance No. 11409, adopted September 7, 1976, and effective October 8. 1976.

The commission has 15 positions. Five members of the commission are appointed to a vacant position by, and serve at the pleasure of, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles. Five members are appointed to a vacant position on the commission by the City of Los Angeles. Five members are selected by the Los Angeles Indian community pursuant to elections conducted by the commission.

The primary purpose of the Commission is to increase the acquisition and application of funding resources to the socio-economic problems of American Indians in Los Angeles City and County.

Currently, the Commission is not codified with the City of Los Angeles and we should equally memorialize our commitment to the Native American community to demonstrate our shared goal with the County to assist and support the American Indians in Los Angeles City and County.

Currently, the Commission is funded by the County at \$510,000 annually and by the City at \$47,0000 annually for staff and supplies.

The City must make every effort to officially formalize and adequately financially support our commitment to the native and indigenous communities as the first people of this region.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council instruct the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), in collaboration with the Los Angeles City/ County Native American Indian Commission (Commission) to report within 30 days on the options available to codify the Commission within the City of Los Angeles.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Council instruct the City Administrative Officer (CAO) to identify \$250,000 to be appropriated in the Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget and future budgets to fund the Los Angeles City/County Native American Indian Commission.

The Los Angeles County voters approved Measure W = Safe, Clean Water Program in November 2018. The adopted ballot measure was the successful result of a collaboration among public health advocates, environmental groups, cities, business, labor, and community organizations. The program will generate an estimated \$285 million annually from a countywide property tax assessment. Once initiated many municipalities and community activists rolled up their sleeves to identify and document the areas with the biggest challenges to consistently deliver safe and clean water to County constituents.

The Bureau of Sanitation's (LASAN) – Safe Clean Water Implementation Division (SCWID) has been working diligently to manage projects, guide the planning and implementation process, and leverage other sources of funds in addition to Measure W. A myriad of groups and jurisdictions proceeded to organize and plan various projects across the County to achieve specific water objectives on long-overdue repairs or invest in major infrastructure to meet regional compliance goals.

Like others, Council District 15 has projects in the pipeline and on the drawing board and is eager to see them move forward to implementation. One such project is the Watts Civic Center Serenity Greenway. The project would provide a historic investment in new green space and a safe pedestrian path linking community schools, a civic center, parks, and a library. It is heavily supported by key local community groups including the Children's Institute and Watts Rising. Council District 15 seeks a status report to provide guidance on the next steps for this Project in order to highlight potential impediments that the Council office should be aware of in order to better work with the community in constructively resolving them.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Sanitation be instructed to report on the status of the Watts Civic Center Serenity Greenway as previously proposed in the Measure W – Safe, Clean Water Program. To better inform the proponents in developing a successful project with meaningful community input, the report should produce a project schedule, the budget and funding status, and any potential impediments related to project completion. This report should also include an overview of the current Measure W projects, and their related schedules and budgets, that the City is working on in Council District 15.



The Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) mission is to support United States citizens and first responders to ensure that as a nation we work together to build, sustain, and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from and mitigate all hazards. In order to meet FEMA's mission, grant programs are offered to first responder agencies, such as the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grants (SAFER).

SAFER was created to provide funding directly to fire departments to help them increase or maintain the number of trained, "front line" firefighters available in their communities. The goal of SAFER is to enhance the local fire departments' abilities to comply with staffing, response and operational standards established by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The SAFER Grants are offered to support projects to hire new, additional firefighters to improve staffing levels.

The objective of the SAFER grant program is to assist local fire departments with staffing and deployment capabilities in order to respond to emergencies, and assure that communities have adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards. Ultimately, SAFER recipients should achieve more efficient responses, thereby ensuring communities have improved protection from fire and fire-related hazards.

On September 15, 2023, the LAFD was notified that its application for the Fiscal Year 2022 SAFER grant was approved in the amount of \$7,752,582 (\$4,311,368.40 for salaries; \$3,441,214.08 for benefits) for the three year performance period of March 13, 2024 through March 12, 2027. FEMA has waived the cost share requirement for this grant award; however, the City is responsible for any costs that exceed grant funding.

This grant award will enable the LAFD to fund an additional 12 firefighter positions to staff a new engine company. Based on the current Firefighter III paygrade salary (MOU negotiations between the City and UFLAC are continuing), the projected costs for 12 firefighter positions for the three year performance period will total \$9,535,385.00 (\$6,824,424.00 for salaries; \$2,710,961.00 for benefits). Because the City must bear the costs exceeding grant funding, as noted above, the current projected fiscal impact to the General Fund is \$1,782,803.00.

Given the substantial benefit to public safety that would be provided through the SAFER grant, it is necessary that Council authorize the LAFD to accept the grant award by no later than October 15, 2023 as required by FEMA.



On November 22, 2022, the City Council approved the vacation of Chick Hearn Court between South Figueroa and Georgia Street (SVAC-E1401399 - Council File No. 21-0859) ("Vacation Area") to allow for the creation of a pedestrian-only promenade between LA Live and Crypto.com Arena.

In order to complete the vacation and deliver this long-awaited pedestrian enhancement, L.A. Live Properties, LLC, ("Applicant") will need to satisfy various conditions of approval of the Street Vacation.

While the Applicant works to satisfy these conditions of approval, a Revocable Permit is necessary for the Applicant to commence the improvements necessary to convert the Vacation Area into a pedestrian-only street as soon as possible.

On February 8, 2023, the City Council directed the Bureau of Engineering (BOE) and any other appropriate City department, bureau, or agency to work cooperatively with the Applicant and its representatives through the B-permit process regarding the Chick Hearn Court Vacation identified in Revocable Permit Application No. 2022000118.

On February 8, 2023, the City Council further directed BOE and any other appropriate City department, bureau, or agency, to issue a Revocable Permit prior to the completion of the Street Vacation on the condition that the Applicant satisfies the conditions of such Revocable Permit and appropriately guarantees, and posts a bond in sufficient amounts to be determined by the City Engineer, to return and reconstruct the right-of-way back to its present condition in the event the Applicant does not effectuate the vacation.

The Applicant is presently clearing conditions of approval of the Street Vacation and awaiting issuance of the Revocable Permit.

BOE requires that the Applicant own the underlying fee of the Vacation Area to complete the vacation process. Condition No. 4 of the Street Vacation requires the Applicant to submit a title report to the City Engineer indicating the vestee of the underlying fee title interest in the Vacation Area. Condition No. 5 of the Street Vacation requires that any fee interest of the Vacation Aea which may be vested in the City of Los Angeles be acquired.

Based on the title report submitted to the City Engineer, the Vacation Area is held in fee by the City. Therefore, the Applicant is requesting that the City sell its interest in the Vacation Area, so that the Applicant may complete the vacation process.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council direct the Department of General Services in consultation with the City Attorney and the City Engineer, to take the actions needed to sell / transfer the City's interest in the Vacation Area with the understanding that the method of transfer shall be by way of a direct sale based on a valuation report prepared by the City.

The Accessible Housing Program (AcHP) ensures that multi-family affordable housing constructed with the assistance of the City and/or the former Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Los Angeles (CRA/LA) is accessible to people with disabilities. This program was established to ensure the City's compliance with and implementation of a Corrected Settlement Agreement (CSA) entered into with the Independent Living Center of Southern California (ILCSC) et al.

The Settlement Agreement (CSA) was approved by the City Council on August 30, 2016, and concurred with by the Mayor on September 5, 2016 (CF No. 12-0014-S23). Pursuant to the CSA, on July 5, 2018, the Court appointed Bill Lann Lee to ensure that the CSA is implemented effectively and to assist the Court in monitoring the City's compliance with this Agreement. Mr. Lee retired in June 2022, and Mr. Tim Fox was appointed as the second Monitor. That appointment was made by Court Order dated June 21, 2022, as a result of a stipulation filed by all parties to the case.

The order appointing Mr. Fox set a budget for the then-current year and acknowledged that the budget for subsequent years would be set accordingly based on need, negotiation with the Monitor, and appropriate approval of any budget increase.

Subsequent to the order appointing the Monitor, the parties (City, plaintiffs, and Court Monitor) negotiated amendments to the settlement agreement (the Amended Corrected Settlement Agreement - ACSA), which was entered as a stipulated judgment by the Court on November 2, 2022.

The ACSA set the compensation amount for the Monitor at \$1.3 million per year. To the extent that the Monitor deems it necessary to retain the services of additional experts or entities, the relevant budgets will be increased to reflect payments to these additional contractors. The FY 23/24 budget, as approved by Council, reflects an increase of \$100K for these additional services.

Consistent with these provisions, LAHD sought \$1.4M for the Monitor and necessary additional expert consultants in the FY23/24 budget, and that amount was approved by the Council and Mayor.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council:

AUTHORIZE the LAHD General Manager or designee to expend up to \$1,400,000 from the Accessible Housing Trust Fund, Fund 10D, for the appointed Court Monitor (FOX & ROBERTSON) FY23/24 fees. Funds from the General Fund were authorized through the FY23/24 adopted budget.

The Hillside Villa Apartments is a 124-unit housing development located at 636 North Hill Place in the neighborhood of Chinatown. The apartments were completed in 1989 with funding from the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Los Angeles (CDA/LA). The loan agreement included a 30-year affordable housing covenant. The covenant has since expired, resulting in significant and prohibitive rent increases for the long-term tenants of the Hillside Villa Apartments.

In 2020, the City of Los Angeles initiated the process of acquiring the Hillside Villa Apartments to avoid the displacement of low-income tenants. In May 2022 (CF 21-0600-s101), the LA City Council voted unanimously to adopt recommendations from the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) that included authorizing LAHD to obtain an appraisal of Hillside Villa Apartments and to negotiate a purchase and sale agreement with the goal of extending the affordability of units in the building.

Since then, nearly 17 months have passed. Meanwhile, hundreds of tenants at Hillside Villa Apartments - including dozens of low-income families and senior residents - are at-risk of losing their housing. Additionally, while in the midst of a homelessness state of emergency, there have been over 40,000 eviction notices issued in Los Angeles since January 2023, and there are about 6,000 units of affordable housing with covenants set to expire within the next 4 years. It is more important than ever that the City act urgently to keep low-income families from falling into homelessness and to preserve as much affordable housing as possible.

I **THEREFORE MOVE** that the Los Angeles Housing Department (LAHD) be instructed to report back within 30 days on the status of the actions approved by the City Council in Council File 21-0600-s101.

The Northeast Valley and Jefferson Park Animal Service Centers provide animal care services for the overflow animals from the six City operated shelters. In 2011, the Department of Animal Services (DAS) executed a contract with Best Friends Animal Society (Best Friends) to operate Northeast Valley, from January 1, 2012 through December 30, 2016. The DAS then executed a second contract with Best Friends to continue operating Northeast Valley, from January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2022. In 2018, DAS executed a contract with Best Friends to operate Jefferson Park, from April 27, 2018 through March 28, 2021, with the option of three one-year extensions. The DAS is in the process of executing the third and final one-year extension, which will expire on April 26, 2024. Under these two contracts, the City paid for basic utilities and maintenance.

In July 2022 and January 2023, the DAS issued Request for Proposals (RFP) to select new operators for the Northeast Valley and Jefferson Park Animal Service Centers respectively. The RFPs state that the awarded operators would be responsible for the utilities and maintenance. Only one response was received from Paws for Life K9 Rescue (Paws for Life) for Northeast Valley, which was a subcontractor of Best Friends and already operating out of the facility. Although Paws for Life was selected, it subsequently informed the DAS that it could not perform the service if obligated to pay for the utilities and maintenance. To ensure services remain uninterrupted, Paws for Life has been operating the Northeast Valley since Best Friends' contract ended on December 31, 2022. The Department anticipates that it will not receive any bids for Jefferson Park if the City requires the contractor to pay for utilities and maintenance. It is in the best interests of the City to continue offering the prior arrangement whereby the City covered the basic utilities and maintenance in exchange for no-cost services to operate the facility. DAS is in the process of issuing a new RFP to address this issue, but needs a lease or license agreement with Best Friends in the interim to operate the Northeast Valley Animal Service Center.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Department of General Services, with the assistance of the Department of Animal Services, the City Administrative Officer, the and Office of the City Attorney, to negotiate a no-cost, one-year lease or license agreement with one-year option to renew at the City's discretion between the City of Los Angeles and Paws for Life K9 Rescue for the operation of the Northeast Valley Animal Service Center for services provided under Contract No. C-128954.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the City Administrative Officer with the assistance of the General Services Department and the Department of Animal Services to report on the funding needed to cover basic utilities and maintenance at the Northeast Valley and Jefferson Park Animal Service Centers.

It is crucial as the City continues to grow that there is a plan to support the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) in providing first responder services to our communities. When new development is built there may be an increased demand on LAFD. In order to assess if there is a relationship between new development and increased fire services, the City should consider a Nexus Study.

Currently in the City, there are 106 Fire Stations and 55 of the stations are over 50 years old and are in need of major infrastructure improvements. As LAFD's infrastructure continues to age, many of the stations are at capacity and operate on staffing levels that are far less than other major Cities. The National Fire Protection Association recommends 1.54 to 1.81 firefighters per 1,000 residents. The City is currently at 0.91 firefighters per 1,000 residents. That is compared to 1.82 for Chicago, 1.77 for San Francisco, and 1.73 for Houston.

LAFD has 3,478 sworn personal and 346 civilian positions. For the City to achieve the recommended National Standards for Coverage of 1.54 to 1.84 Firefighters per 1,000 residents, the City will need to increase the staffing levels between 5,927 (28.8 Firefighters at 206 Stations) to 6,966 (28.8 Firefighters at 242 Stations). This shows the need for an additional 100 - 142 new stations across the City. As the needs of the Fire Department have evolved over the years, the additional stations and their design may also evolve, new stations may not need to be the same size or typology as traditional fire stations and may be able to co-locate within residential, commercial and industrial buildings.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Council instruct the Fire Department, Chief Legislative Analyst and City Administrative Officer, in consultation with the Planning Department and the Department of Building and Safety, to report to the Council regarding the necessary steps to conduct a Nexus / Fcasibility Study to determine if there is a relationship between new development and increased fire services.

Tax Increment Financing, referred to as "TIF," is a set of public financing tools that allocate a portion of future property tax revenue, within an established district boundary, to be used to fund capital and operating costs related to infrastructure developments. TIF works by freezing property tax revenues from the district at a base level ("baseline revenue") and diverting a portion of additional tax revenue in future years above the baseline revenue (the "increment") to pay for projects directly or to pay back bonds serviced by the increment. TIF mechanisms only redirect property taxes and do not create any additional tax burden for property owners.

In California, TIF has historically been used by redevelopment agencies to raise funding for infrastructure improvements, land assembly, housing, and other projects in redevelopment areas. Redevelopment agencies in California were required by state law to dissolve as of February 1, 2012.

In 2014, with Senate Bill (SB) 628 the State revamped existing Infrastructure Financing Districts into Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts ("EIFDs"). EIFDs are a type of TIF district that cities and counties could form to help fund economic development projects. EIFDs are funded by future property tax revenue increment allocations from both the City and County and can generate revenues.

Several legislative measures have passed that modified SB 628 and EIFD requirements: Assembly Bill 733 (2017) allows for EIFDs to fund climate change adaptation projects, including but not limited to projects that address conditions that impact public health (such as decreased air and water quality, temperatures higher than average, etc.) and extreme weather events (such as sea level rise, heat waves, wildfires, etc.); Senate Bill 1145 (2018) allows EIFDs to also fund infrastructure maintenance costs; and Assembly Bill 116 (2019) allows for EIFDs to issue bonds without public vote however does increase public engagement requirements.

With these modifications, EIFDs are currently able to fund infrastructure maintenance and housing development, economic development, transportation infrastructure, sewage treatment, and climate adaptation projects, among other uses. EIFDs can also finance infrastructure that supports specific industries like tourism and entertainment or development priorities, such as technology hubs, renewable energy projects, or workforce housing initiatives, further promoting targeted economic growth. Additionally, while EIFDs are not required to set aside a specific percentage of affordable housing, all housing that is developed must be affordable.

As a version of TIF, EIFDs do not increase property taxes, as they cannot pull property taxes from school districts. EIFDs are governed by a Public Financing Authority (PFA) made up of 5 members of at least 3 elected officials and 2 local community members who live or work in the district area. The PFA oversees the creation of the District's Infrastructure Financing Plan (IFP), which outlines the specific projects the District will fund.

In 2018, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) retained consulting firm Kosmont Companies to evaluate several regions for the feasibility of implementation of TIF mechanisms, such as EIFDs, to support housing production and sustainable infrastructure



investment. The San Pedro community was among the communities to meet SCAG's preliminary screening criteria. On June 5, 2019, the Council approved recommendations from an Economic Development Committee report that produced a report with the necessary steps to initiate and form an EIFD in San Pedro, including a Resolution of Intention for the EIFD's governing PFA (CF 19-0408). On May 9, 2023, the Council authorized EWDD to develop and submit an EIFD participation application package to the County that would identify potential projects and contribution rates.

As San Pedro- and all of our neighborhoods- grow and evolve, so do the housing, infrastructure, and capital improvement needs. Investments in affordable housing, housing-supportive infrastructure, and facilities benefitting the small business community, streets, sidewalks, parks, and other public amenities can have a catalytic effect on economic development in San Pedro. The demands of urban living require constant investment in critical infrastructure. Funding these projects can often be challenging due to competing budget priorities. EIFDs could provide a unique financing mechanism for our local government to meet the infrastructure needs and to further support economic development as a means by which we can use existing tax growth to fund local projects.

One of the unique aspects of EIFDs is their ability to facilitate collaboration between the public and private sectors. City and County governments can partner with private entities to finance and implement infrastructure projects, leveraging their expertise, resources, and innovation to maximize the impact of limited public funds. EIFDs also offer flexibility and customization, allowing local communities to tailor financing plans to their specific needs and priorities. Depending on the State's regulations, they can be established for different durations, ranging from 15 to 45 years. This stability in funding allows communities to plan and implement infrastructure projects more effectively, resulting in improved infrastructure and a better quality of life for residents.

Although there are a handful of approved EIFDs in the State, several jurisdictions across California are actively in the process of forming their own EIFDs. By capturing future property tax revenues, EIFDs create a predictable revenue stream that can be used to finance long-term infrastructure investments and priority projects for the community.

From fixing our sidewalks and gutters to standing up energy-efficient public facilities—reimaging a future Los Angeles composed of unique, livable neighborhoods for all of our residents requires rethinking how we invest in our affordable housing, infrastructure needs, and community revitalization improvements. As the City and County are embarking on exploring EIFDs across the region, the City Council would benefit by making sound decisions based on a guiding policy that keeps the City in compliance with its fiscal policies as well as meets the goals of our future economic growth.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the Chief Legislative Analyst, with the assistance of the City Administrative Officer, Economic Workforce Development Department, and the Office of Finance, report in 45 days with policy recommendations related to budgetary actions and criteria to support the establishment of Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts (EIFD), including:

- a. How to best tailor financing plans to a community's specific needs and priorities, using the San Pedro EIFD as a case study.
- b. Identify elements that could be financed through EIFDs, such as affordable housing, infrastructure needs, and community revitalization improvements, and how to determine whether to fund certain improvements outside of the creation of an Infrastructure Financing Plan, and the potential impact regardingthe issuance of bonds.
- c. Budgetary considerations that would ensure the City's ability to maintain compliance with the City's Financial Policies by the growth of future EIFDs.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Chief Legislative Analyst, with the assistance of the City Administrative Officer, and Economic Workforce Development Department report in 45 days with the personnel, staff resources, and a plan needed for sustained work efforts on the evaluation, implementation and maintenance of EIFDs.

<u>Debt Impact Statement:</u> The CAO reports that the issuance of Municipal Improvement Corporation of Los Angeles (MICLA) debt is a General Fund obligation. The issuance of MICLA for the reauthorization of the Vision Theatre project would cause the City to borrow \$160,439 at an approximate 5.5 percent interest rate over 20 years. The issuance of MICLA for the reauthorization of the Los Angeles Convention Center Expansion project, which requires an additional \$500,000, would cause the City to borrow \$500,000 at an approximate 5.5 percent interest rate over 20 years. The total estimated debt service for the projects is \$1,105,302, including interest of approximately \$444,863. During the life of the bonds, the estimated average annual debt service is \$55,265 for 20 years. Actual interest rates may differ as rates are dependent on market conditions at the time of issuance. The CAO cannot fully predict what interest rates will be in the future. In accordance with the City's Debt Management Policy, the City has an established debt ceiling to uide in evaluating the affordability for future debt. The debt ceiling for non-voted direct debt as a percentage of General Fund revenues is 6.0 percent. The 2023-24 Proposed Budget non voter-approved debt ratio is 2.93 percent. The issuance of debt for these projects will not cause the City to exceed the six percent non-voter approved debt limit.

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies, proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency, must have first been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant (Hyperion) is the largest wastewater treatment plant west of the Mississippi River, and has served not only Los Angeles but also nearby cities including El Segundo, Culver City, Beverly Hills, Santa Monica, West Hollywood, San Fernando, Glendale and Burbank, since 1957; and

WHEREAS, on Sunday, July 11, 2021, the Bureau of Sanitation's (LASAN) Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant suffered a major flood that resulted in the overflow of wastewater into Santa Monica Bay in an incident that was unprecedented and unforeseeable; and

WHEREAS, LASAN is working closely and cooperatively with neighbors as well as state and federal water quality and air quality regulators to resolve issues relating to the July 11 incident, including infrastructure upgrades; and

WHEREAS, Hyperion maintains a continuous air quality monitoring program, which includes the voluntary installation of hydrogen sulfide (H2S) monitoring stations along the plant's fence line and within the City of El Segundo, which provide real-time air quality data that is accessible to the public, and that H2S is known to be a characteristic of wastewater treatment facilities and sewers, whereas volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and nitrogen oxides (NOx) emissions can be attributed to multiple sources within a community; and

WHEREAS, since the July 2021 incident, the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) has collected several survey air measurements in the community nearby Hyperion to measure for H2S and VOCs; and

WHEREAS, over the past two years, data from air quality sampling indicated that emission levels remain below the California state standard; and

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2022, SCAQMD and the City entered into a Stipulated Order of Abatement (Stipulated Order) which, among other things, required Hyperion to conduct 24-hour community air sampling within the City of El Segundo using federal standards ("EPA TO-15") to test for various compounds; and

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles and LASAN have committed to working with the SCAQMD to continue deployment of best available odor control technologies and to improve operation and maintenance best practices at Hyperion in compliance with regulatory requirements; and

WHEREAS, currently pending in the Legislature is AB 1216 (Muratsuchi), which would require, on or before January 1, 2025, the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility that is located within 1,500 feet of a residential area to develop, install, operate, and maintain a fence-line monitoring system for specified pollutants in accordance with guidance developed by the appropriate air quality management district, of which, as currently written, is only imposed on the Hyperion Plant; and

WHEREAS, LASAN is acting in good faith to work with SCAQMD on its air sample testing to determine independently whether there is a need for additional regulation and/or monitoring of air quality around Hyperion as part of LASAN's commitment to protecting public health.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2023-24 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for AB 1216 (Muratsuchi) relative to requiring the Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant to develop, install, operate, and maintain fence-line monitoring systems IF AMENDED to:

CPRA-032-Clerk-000200

- 1. Provide that the State of California fund the local agency for costs associated with the proposed solution.
- 2. Provide that the provisions of the measure take effect based on the conclusive findings by the SCAQMD that there is a need for additional air quality monitoring requirements.
- 3. Provide that if conditions of item 2 above are met, in-lieu of continuous fenceline monitoring for VOCs and NOx, periodic community sampling for these two constituents take place over the next three years.



The Lake Hollywood Park and Innsdale Trail area is one of the most visited locations in the City of Los Angeles due to their close proximity to the Hollywood Sign. Despite its popularity, it is difficult for the City to accurately track the number of visitors to this area on a consistent and regular basis, which leads to a lack of insight and understanding of visitation patterns – information ultimately needed for City departments to adequately provide infrastructure and services to meet visitor demand.

Contemporary "smart" counting devices are able to take account of user volumes without collecting identifiable information on individuals or vehicles. In fact, the Bureau of Street Lighting (BSL) has already deployed such sensors in a few pilot instances for counting pedestrian volumes around the downtown entertainment district in order to brighten the lights during heavy crowd volumes. By utilizing lighting poles already present in these locations, the BSL Smart Cities division could provide innovative infrastructure to establish an understanding of visitor numbers and patterns. By coupling the technology with the operational expertise of the Department of Transportation to interpret and present data collected, new counting devices in the vicinity of Lake Hollywood Park could help us capture valuable visitor data in order to address services and infrastructure demands in the area.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Bureau of Street Lighting to report back, with the assistance of the Department of Transportation, within 60 days, with an analysis and project delivery plan to install sensors and/or other technologies capable of counting pedestrian and vehicles in the vicinity of Lake Hollywood Park, and the east and west Innsdale Trail entrances. The deployed technology should be able to count pedestrians and vehicles continuously, all day, every day, and that data should be recorded and available for departmental use.

The Department of Transportation (LADOT) is currently in the early design stages for a project known as LA RiverWay Phase IV (Project), which will extend the LA RiverWay active transportation path west from the current terminus at the Riverside Drive Bridge / Zoo Drive for approximately one mile northwest towards Forest Lawn Drive. This project covers a key segment of the LA RiverWay's eventual full alignment as envisioned and adopted in the 2007 Los Angeles River Revitalization Master Plan (Revitalization Master Plan), the Los Angeles County 2022 Los Angeles River Master Plan Update (County Master Plan), and other documents. Conceptual design of the LA RiverWay in the San Fernando Valley portion has been completed in the Los Angeles River Valley Bikeway and Greenway Design Completion Project Feasibility Study Report (FSR).

The LA Riverway Phase IV is a unique active transportation segment along the Los Angeles River because of its proximity to Griffith Park equestrian trails, equestrian amenities, and equestrian facilities that connect across and along the river. While the LA RiverWay Phase IV project already proposes to separate equestrian and bicycle/walking facilities running alongside one another, it is imperative that the Project go above and beyond to ensure the safest facilities for both equestrian and other users when designing the alignment and planned uses for the segment. This includes maintaining a 10' ideal minimum width for equestrian segments where feasible, designing any path intersections in a way to slow down people biking, adding protection from freeway noise, visual blight, and pollution, and the provision of appropriate buffering and vertical separation of path types.

An alignment closest to "Preferred Multiuse Trail Combinations" on page 67 of the County Master Plan, with exclusive space for people on horseback, people biking, and people walking, is ultimately preferred in this keystone segment. While some constraints may be unavoidable, all efforts should be taken to accumulate any needed width through encroachments/easements to eliminate mixing uses or reducing the width of the equestrian path below 10'. Additionally, as currently scoped, the Project will stop short, approximately 200' east of a maintenance gate and ramp to Forest Lawn Drive. Therefore there are two cycling infrastructure gaps to contend with:

- The short-term gap of completing a cycling route from the current western terminus of the Project to the intersection of Forest Lawn Drive and Zoo Drive, where active transportation safety improvements are in the design stage for Forest Lawn Drive; and
- The long-term gap of having the LA RiverWay off-street facility traverse the CA-134 freeway.

LADOT should take appropriate steps to plan accordingly and work to make sure LA RiverWay Phase IV does not end abruptly, with no exit path, especially in the short-term of the anticipated completion date of the LA RiverWay Phase IV Project.

I THEREFORE MOVE that the City Council instruct the Department of Transportation, with assistance from the Bureau of Street Services, and the Bureau of Engineering, to report back within 45 days, on implementing a design for the LA RiverWay Phase IV Project that prioritizes maximizing space and enjoyment for all uses, and forms a continuous segment with an outlet at Forest Lawn Drive or another identified bicycle/pedestrian facility. This should include: encroachments/easements or other agreements necessary with other jurisdictions in order

to eliminate mixing modal uses, maintain a minimum 10' equestrian-only path, construct fencing, bend cycling segments to slow cyclists at trail junctions, and any other needed design elements. The report should also outline steps to protect the trail from the negative impacts of the CA-134 freeway. The report should outline anticipated costs of any needed encroachments/easements and elements to protect the trail from the negative impacts of the CA-134 freeway and methods to cover those costs.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the Department of Transportation, with assistance from the Bureau of Engineering, to report back within 90 days with a project development plan to close the anticipated short-term gap between the western terminus of the LA RiverWay Phase IV Project and the intersection of Forest Lawn Drive and Zoo Drive. This report should identify a potential lead agency or partner agencies, anticipated cost, funding sources, and design constraints and should outline how a gap closure can be completed at the same time as LA RiverWay Phase IV. The report should also outline whether the short-term gap closure should be led by LADOT or Caltrans.

I FURTHER MOVE that the City Council instruct the Department of Transportation, with the assistance of the Bureau of Engineering, to report back within 90 days with a desired scope for a long-term gap closure traversing the CA-134 freeway for the LA RiverWay and improvement of the CA-134 westbound offramp and Forest Lawn Drive intersection. The report should identify Caltrans as the preferred lead agency, and should identify any other partner agencies and speak to the overlapping jurisdictions, land ownership, and projects of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP), the City of Los Angeles, the City of Burbank, and Caltrans. The report should outline project outreach steps to take with Caltrans.

An ordinance adding Section 8.33 to Article 3, Chapter 3, Division 8 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code to specify the procedures for establishing a Mayoral Declaration of Local Housing and/or Homelessness Emergency, and the impact of the Declaration.

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 8.33 is added to Article 3, Chapter 3, Division 8 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code to read as follows:

Sec. 8.33. Local Housing and/or Homelessness Emergency.

- (a) The term "Local Housing and/or Homelessness Emergency" as used in this section shall mean a local emergency due to the existence of a critical shortage of local affordable housing and/or an emergency on homelessness, as further defined in this section. Local Housing and/or Homelessness Emergency, as used in this section, shall not be subject to the other provisions of Article 3, Chapter 3, Division 8 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code.
- (b) The Mayor is hereby empowered to declare the existence of a local housing and/or homelessness emergency when the Mayor finds that:
 - (i) The City's housing supply is projected to be at least 40 percent below its annual housing production goals as established in the Housing Element approved by the State Department of Housing and Community Development and reported in the City Planning Department's quarterly Housing Production Report; and/or
 - (ii) Homelessness in the City has reached a crisis as indicated by either:
 - (1) The unhoused population in the City is greater than two times the total number of interim beds as established in the annual Homeless Inventory Count submitted to the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development; or
 - (2) There is a citywide increase by more than 20 percent in a single year as reported in the annual Point-in-Time Count.

Such a declaration by the Mayor shall be in writing and shall take effect immediately upon its issuance. The Mayor shall cause widespread publicity and notice to be given of the declaration through the most feasible and adequate means of disseminating the notice throughout the City.

- (c) Upon the Mayor's declaration of a local housing and/or homelessness emergency, the Mayor shall coordinate citywide planning and response with respect to unsheltered or unhoused individuals in conjunction with the City Administrative Office, Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, Los Angeles City Housing Department, Los Angeles City Planning Department, and all other necessary departments and agencies. The Mayor shall also coordinate the City's efforts to address a declared emergency under this section with the County of Los Angeles, the State of California, and the federal government. Within 30 days, the Mayor shall submit to the City Council a plan of action to address the emergency.
 - (d) A declaration pursuant to this section empowers the Mayor to:
 - (i) Promulgate, issue and enforce rules, regulations, orders and directives which the Mayor considers necessary to address the emergency. Such rules, regulations, orders, and directives shall take effect immediately upon their issuance, and copies thereof shall be filed in the Office of the City Clerk. The City Council may supersede a rule, regulation, order, or directive by adopting a resolution or ordinance that addresses the same subject matter.
 - (ii) Commandeer property deemed necessary to meet interim and temporary housing needs and bind the City for the fair value thereof. The City Council may adopt a resolution that imposes limits on action taken under this subsection.
 - (iii) Require emergency service of any City officer or employee and requisition necessary personnel or material of any City department or agency.
 - (iv) Order any action relative to the procurement of construction contracts, service provider contracts, supplies, and equipment for homelessness facilities to safeguard life, health or property caused by the emergency.
 - (v) Suspend competitive bidding restrictions enumerated in Charter Section 371(e)(6) and Los Angeles Administrative Code Sections 10.15 and 10.17 for contracts entered into by City departments and offices in response to the emergency and mitigation efforts related to the emergency, subject to the following:
 - (1) Such suspension may remain in effect until the Mayor terminates the suspension or the City Council finds the suspension is no longer needed and acts to terminate the suspension;
 - (2) Contracts using the suspended competitive bidding restrictions specified in this subsection may be for a term no longer than one year; thereafter, further contracting for the same need shall be accomplished by competitive bidding whenever applicable;

- (3) The City Council may terminate a contract awarded under this subsection and require competitive bidding; and
- (4) The City Administrative Officer shall evaluate and report monthly to the City Council on the reasons justifying why each contract let pursuant to this subsection was necessary to respond to the emergency, including why the emergency did not permit a delay resulting from a competitive solicitation for bids or proposals and why competitive proposals or bidding was not reasonably practicable or compatible with the City's interests.
- (e) Whenever the Mayor declares a local housing and/or homelessness emergency, the Chief Legislative Analyst's Office shall prepare, with the assistance of the City Attorney, a resolution ratifying the existence of a local housing and/or homelessness emergency. Such resolution shall be submitted by the Mayor to the City Clerk for presentation to the City Council. Within 30 days from the date of the original declaration by the Mayor, the City Council may consider the resolution and rescind it by majority vote. Thereafter, the declaration shall expire unless the City Council renews it by majority vote every 90 calendar days.
- (f) The City Administrative Officer and the General Managers of the Department of Housing and the Department of Planning, or their designee, shall monitor the state of the emergency, report quarterly, and provide the report to the Mayor and the City Council two weeks in advance of the quarter on the status of the emergency and the progress in addressing the emergency.
- (g) After the City Council reviews the quarterly reports in Section 8.33(c) from the City Administrative Officer and the General Managers of the Department of Housing and the Department of Planning, or their designee, if the City Council finds that a need for the emergency no longer exists, or the emergency is no longer beyond the control of the normal services, personnel, equipment and facilities of the regularly constituted components and departments of the City government, the City Council may act to terminate or not renew the declaration under this Section 8.33.
- Sec. 2. **URGENCY CLAUSE**. The City Council finds and declares that this ordinance is required for the immediate protection of the public peace, health, and safety for the following reasons: the City of Los Angeles remains in the midst of a historic crisis in people experiencing homelessness and continues to face a critical shortage of affordable housing. Over 40,000 Angelenos are unhoused, many of whom are unsheltered. Unsheltered individuals face many perils, including exposure to weather, crime, and other dangerous health risks. Some people experiencing homelessness suffer from serious mental illness and/or substance abuse disorders. The risks to public health and safety are obvious and impose significant dangers to unhoused individuals and all Angelenos. Although the City has made

progress in addressing these serious problems, much more needs to be done. For all of these reasons, the ordinance shall become effective upon publication pursuant to Los Angeles Charter Section 253.

Sec. 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and have it published in accordance with Council policy, either in a daily newspaper circulated in the City of Los Angeles or by posting for ten days in three public places in the City of Los Angeles: one copy on the bulletin board located at the Main Street entrance to the Los Angeles City Hall; one copy on the bulletin board located at the Main Street entrance to the Los Angeles City Hall East; and one copy on the bulletin board located at the Temple Street entrance to the Los Angeles County Hall of Records.

Re: Housing and Homelessness Emergency Action Plan

Los Angeles' Administrative Code provides that the Mayor has the authority to declare the existence of a local emergency as a result of any occurrence which, by reason of its magnitude, is or is likely to overwhelm the normal operations of City government. For several years, the humanitarian crisis of homelessness has clearly required a City response that goes beyond business as usual, and so Mayor Bass' first action upon taking office -- on December 12, 2022, the first day of her Administration -- was to come together with City Departments and Members of City Council declare a State of Emergency to confront Los Angeles' housing and homelessness crisis. The City Council ratified the Mayor's declaration on December 13, 2022.

The Updated Emergency Declaration

This action plan addresses the response to the updated emergency declaration required pursuant to LAMC Section 8.33. The Office of the Mayor will prepare an update every 90 days to inform the decision to continue or terminate the emergency declaration.

The Mayor is authorized to declare a Section 8.33 emergency on housing and homelessness if any one of three criteria are present:

- Housing supply is projected to be at least 40 percent below the annual housing production goals as established in the City's Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA);
- 2. There exists more than twice the number of unhoused people in the City of LA than the number of interim beds; or
- 3. A citywide increase in unhoused individuals by more than 20% in a single year as reported in the annual point in time count (PIT).



The first and second criteria currently exist and thus support the Mayor's declaration of the emergency. According to the Planning Department, the City is 60.3% below the annual production goal for the current eight-year RHNA cycle of 2021-2029. LAHSA reports that 16,521 interim beds exist between their stock and new efforts to increase interim housing from the City, while the recently released PIT count indicated that there are 46,260 unhoused individuals in the City, well more than twice the number of interim beds.

The Emergency Declaration will allow the City to continue to respond aggressively to the crisis, including expediting contracting and streamlining processing of affordable housing and permanent supportive housing projects. Increasing the supply of both permanent and long term interim housing units will count towards satisfying the LA Alliance lawsuit. Importantly, it sends a clear signal that the City is committed to an aggressive and proactive plan to address unsheltered homelessness.

A Framework for Addressing the Housing and Homelessness Crisis

The Mayor's Office will continue to build on the years of committed work City Councilmembers have done to address homelessness in their districts and looks forward to continuing to integrate our work on this crisis. The framework of this Action Plan is centered on moving unsheltered individuals from encampments to interim housing to permanent, stable and affordable housing.

To that end, the Action Plan is organized around three broad objectives:

- 1. Resolve encampments by housing people in interim, then stable permanent housing
- 2. Expedite affordable housing development
- 3. Prevent Angelenos from falling into homelessness

The objectives are realized by programs and policies driven by core principles:

- This is a coordinated citywide approach in partnership with the City Council;
- This is a unified approach across all levels of government, from federal, to state, to county and local;
- Our work is built on lessons learned from the first 7 months of action under the original Emergency Declaration (December 2022 June 2023) and we will continue to evolve, developing new programs and partnerships based on what we learn;
- We must cut red tape, eliminate barriers, streamline and expedite processes and refrain from creating new bureaucracies as we lift up programs;
- We must innovate in using our existing resources and seek new resources and opportunities;
- We must do better to collect and report data, and importantly track and report outcomes.

OBJECTIVE 1: Resolve Encampments by Housing People

The programs and processes for sustainable encampment resolution are detailed below. This section is divided into three programmatic areas:

- 1. Bring people inside
- 2. Expand the infrastructure of stable, permanent interim housing options
- 3. Remove barriers and streamline access to housing

1. Bring People Inside

Inside Safe (IS): As of August 4, 2023, Inside Safe has held 23 operations with 8 nonprofit service providers across 13 Council Districts bringing more than 1400 people inside. During this pilot phase, we have established an infrastructure/workflow across our stakeholders – Mayor's Office, City Council, City departments, LAHSA, Service Providers, and County agencies.

The IS Field Intervention Team started in July and serves as the City's internal outreach/engagement team throughout all phases of Inside Safe. This will include:

- Encampment assessment
- Transition to interim housing
- Coordination of service connection
- Quality control across program and data collection

The City Council has been a critical partner in launching Inside Safe and providing funding for this citywide effort.

Los Angeles County is responsible for providing homeless health-related services for the City of Los Angeles. For Inside Safe participants, the Mayor's Office will continue to collaborate with County Supervisors and the County's Chief Executive Office - Homeless Initiative to connect our participants with a number of County agencies and departments including:

- Department of Health Services Multidisciplinary Teams and Department of Mental Health Homeless & Mobile Engagement Teams who partner with us on Inside Safe operations
- Department of Health Services Mobile Clinic System provides comprehensive primary, urgent and women's healthcare;
- Department of Mental Health provides support, and treatment to individuals with severe and persistent mental illness who are experiencing unsheltered homelessness and exhibiting signs of severe impairment;
- Department of Public Social Services provides eligibility determination and enrollment in various programs and services (e.g., Medi-Cal, In-Home supportive services, CalFresh, CalWORKS, General Relief, etc) designed to assist families and individuals who are homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless;
- Department of Public Health Substance Abuse Prevention and Control (DPH-SAPC) refers participants to the Client Engagement and Navigation Services (CENS) program to address substance use and addiction.

Substance Use Disorder and Mental Health Pilot Program: As a part of the Mayor's comprehensive commitment to bringing unhoused Angelenos inside, on July 31, 2023, the Mayor's Office transmitted to Council our proposed pilot program to supplement the extension of substance use and mental health treatment for interim housing residents citywide. The program will use the \$7,825,658 from the FY 22-23 Opioid and Tobacco Settlement funds to reimburse providers for additional time and services not covered by existing state and federal funding. The City will work with Council offices, 16 service providers, 5 treatment centers, LAHSA, and LA County Department of Public Health Substance Use Prevention and Control to collect and analyze data to evaluate this pilot program's referral process as well as impacts on people with substance use disorder who are willing/ready to pursue inpatient treatment.

Encampment Resolution Grant: In June 2023 the County's Housing for Health team, in partnership with the City of Los Angeles, was awarded a \$60M Encampment Resolution Grant (ERG). The ERG will serve 3,000 unsheltered individuals from Los Angeles' Skid Row neighborhood within 3 years. The grant funds will enhance existing outreach teams to engage encampment residents; create a Safe Landings space that provides 24/7 health and behavioral health services with triage beds; enhance existing and create new interim housing sites; connect participants to intensive case management services including housing navigation; and facilitate permanent housing placements with the appropriate level of services.

RV Task Force: In 2022, RVs were 15.4% of the total homeless count or 22.8% of unsheltered count. An estimated 6,484 people were living in 3,964 RVs in the City of Los Angeles. Since May 2022, the CAO's outreach team has led and/or helped to coordinate more than 20 large-scale RV outreach operations in eight separate Council Districts. At least two additional Council offices opted to address RVs in their districts on their own. Based on these experiences, the CAO worked with all relevant City departments, including and especially LADOT, LASAN, and LAPD, along with the City Attorney's office and LAHSA, to develop protocols for streamlining the process for identifying and addressing RVs in the City.

The Mayor's Office will convene a task force with City Council and appropriate departments including LADOT, LASAN, the City Attorney, BOE and CAO to develop a comprehensive citywide strategy based on the work done to date. This strategy will include a budget, sites that can be used for storage and parking, and next steps to take action. The Mayor's Office has already begun reviewing City land that could be used for this endeavor.

2. Expand the infrastructure of permanent interim housing options

Interim housing is a vital step in the journey to permanent housing and the City currently lacks a stable supply of beds. With our FY23/24 budget, the Mayor's Office is moving to lower the cost of interim housing for Inside Safe as well as establish a permanent citywide

infrastructure of interim housing. Currently, federal investment focuses on financing permanent housing and leaves a gap in support for interim housing - we plan to bridge that through these efforts.

Long Term Leasing or Occupancy Agreements: The Mayor's Office is working to shift nightly hotel bookings to longer term occupancy agreements. These agreements will target 100% occupancy of Inside Safe participants, which can better facilitate service provision and safety while ensuring a steady stock of housing units for ongoing encampment resolution. We will target motels in the areas with the greatest need for interim housing resources.

Expand the City's Permanent Supply of Interim Housing: Our system lacks a stable supply of interim housing. The FY23/24 Inside Safe Budget has \$47M identified, which along with other sources, will be used for interim housing acquisitions. The Mayor is committed to exploring every opportunity to expand interim housing through collaboration with council office investments, state partnerships (including the 500 units of temporary shelter pledged by Governor Newsom), and philanthropic efforts.

3. Removing Barriers and streamlining access to housing

The Mayor's Office will employ strategies to remove barriers in the pipeline to permanent housing and speed the matching of interim housing participants with available units.

Federal Efforts: Los Angeles was selected to be part of the Biden administration's ALL INside initiative that partners with state and local governments to strengthen and accelerate local efforts to help people move off the streets. It is our hope that this partnership will help expedite our efforts to address United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines that are barriers to permanent housing. This includes "presumptive eligibility" for voucher holders, which would allow housing navigators to more quickly move people into permanent housing while completing the necessary documentation and paperwork afterward.

The Mayor's Office will continue working with HACLA, the City Council, and the County to push for waivers from HUD that will cut red tape and get people housed more quickly.

Encourage landlords to accept Housing Choice Vouchers: The Mayor has called on all Los Angeles property owners to accept Housing Choice Vouchers (HCV) and expand our available permanent housing stock. The Mayor's Office will work with HACLA to launch a series of networking events across the City to engage with and educate property owners about the HCV program. In addition, the Mayor's Office will seek feedback from property owners and review best practices to identify process improvements that can make participation in the HCV programs smooth and efficient.

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OBJECTIVE 2: Expedite Affordable Housing Development

It is imperative that we build more affordable housing, at a lower cost, and a greater speed. To address this, the Mayor's Office will:

- 1. Accelerate housing approvals and expand production
- 2. Expand financing options to bring more affordability and preserve the housing stock
- 3. Embrace innovations in construction

1. Accelerate Housing Approvals and Expanding Production

Executive Directive 1 (ED1): The Department of City Planning is expected to release the draft ordinance creating a permanent program based on ED1 in late August. The draft ordinance adoption process will include public hearings, review by the City Planning Commission, and final consideration by the City Council and Mayor. ED1, and the subsequent permanent program, will continue to expedite and streamline the development of 100% affordable housing citywide. Thus far, ED 1 has accelerated 31 projects, totaling 2,342 units of affordable housing. There are an additional 56 projects currently under review.

Executive Directive 3 (ED3): ED3 was signed to maximize the use of city-owned property for temporary and permanent housing. In August 2023 the Mayor's Office is convening 3 interdepartmental working groups that will both develop ongoing processes to identify lands suitable for housing development and also streamline and make consistent the City's approach to soliciting and selecting teams to develop on its lands. The Mayor's Office will continue to support innovations around the use and development of City-owned land. Thus far, the Mayor's Office has reviewed more than 3,300 parcels of publicly owned land and worked with City Council colleagues to identify potential sites for future development.

Metro's 10K Plan: LA Metro has released a plan to build 10,000 units of housing on Metro owned land. Of the 17 sites Metro has identified thus far for this effort, 12 sites are within the City of Los Angeles. As chair of the Metro board, Mayor Bass will work to ensure that affordability is maximized in the development of the 10,000 units. In addition, the Mayor's office will proactively coordinate with Metro to manage the pipeline of units on each of the 12 sites to expedite permitting and approvals and support the necessary financing.

2. Expand financing options to bring more affordability and preserve the housing stock

Affordable housing financing has become increasingly complex and cumbersome for developers, exacerbating costs and timelines. Furthermore, there is not adequate financing available to meet our housing development needs. Additionally, with the very public collapse of the over 2,000 units operated by the Skid Row Housing Trust, it has become glaringly clear that our older stock of permanent supportive housing is at risk of failing. All these factors drive our plan to expand the options for innovative and flexible

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financing solutions focused on reducing the cost of housing and creating more opportunities for affordability.

Innovative Financing Solutions: The Mayor's Office is bringing on a consultant to explore innovations in financing for affordable housing. There will be 3 targeted outcomes:

- Create a fund that will allow banks or CDFIs to underwrite the rent levels of tenant based vouchers, likely in the form of a guarantee program.
- Create a Fund to increase affordability in market rate or mixed income projects that are entitled but have not started construction.
- Develop a systematic approach to assessing financing options, structured around a cost benefit analysis.

Joint Powers Authority: At the request of the Mayor's Office, the CAO is assessing the potential for the city to join existing Joint Powers Authorities (JPA) which will create a new tax exempt bond financing option for developers that provide mixed income and 100% affordable housing in the City. If determined to be a beneficial option, the proposal will be brought to City Council for review and approval.

United to House LA (ULA): Under the direction of the Mayor's Office, LAHD is creating a plan to use ULA funding to improve affordable housing financing, rehabilitate existing affordable housing, and support expanded ADU programs and home ownership. If the City wins the pending litigation over ULA, this plan will be ready for immediate execution.

Project Based Vouchers (PBV): According to LAHD staff, there are approximately 25 projects in the City's affordable and supportive housing pipelines that are in need of project based vouchers, with 809 units. Over the next several years HACLA is targeting redevelopment of its public housing properties and will require approximately 1,000 project based vouchers to augment operating expenses. PBVs are highly constrained, and shortages continue to impact the City's pipeline. The Mayor's Office will advocate for more PBV allocation and explore other pathways to address the capital needs of these projects.

3. Innovations in Construction

The Mayor's office will facilitate the greater use and adoption of innovative construction techniques by reviewing our permitting systems as they apply to innovative construction types like modular and offsite manufactured housing and adopting new streamlined approaches. The Mayor's office is partnering to secure grant funding for this initiative which could launch in early 2024, or sooner if feasible.

OBJECTIVE 3: Preventing Homelessness

Since the COVID eviction moratorium was lifted on February 1, 2023, LAHD has received approximately 1,800 3-day notices to quit per week. Previous protection laws gave tenants until August 1, 2023 to pay any missing rent due from March 1, 2020 to

September 30, 2021. With the August 1st deadline passing, we expect a spike in notices to quit and unlawful detainers.

Public Information Campaign: The Mayor's Office and the Los Angeles Housing Department launched a public information campaign to get the word out about new protections and resources for Angelenos. This campaign is targeted to high-risk zip codes, in multiple languages, with ads run on a variety of social media platforms and even taco trucks.

Proactive Outreach: The Mayor's office will be collaborating with outside organizations to do outreach to educate tenants on their rights and how to seek legal assistance if they receive notice of eviction. These community-wide efforts will help at-risk Angelenos stay housed.

ULA Tenant Protection Programs: The Mayor's Office proposes using over \$80M in FY23/24 Measure ULA dollars to fund rental assistance programs. These proposed expenditures include:

- Short Term Emergency Assistance Program that will allow eligible low-income tenant households to apply for up to six months owed back rent due to a one time economic hardship.
- Eviction Defense/Prevention to continue and expand the Stay Housed LA (SHLA)
 program that provides households at risk of eviction with legal support, "know your
 rights" education, and, in limited cases, rental assistance through settlements with
 their landlords.
- Tenant Outreach and Education campaign to provide broad and targeted tenant education outreach services, including workshops, legal clinics, paid and earned media, and targeted social media.
- Additional infrastructure, technology, and community outreach, to educate tenants and landlords about their rights and obligations, and to enforce the Tenant Anti-Harassment Ordinance (TAHO) (effective August 6, 2021) to protect tenants from harassment by landlords.

The Mayor's Office is committed to addressing the housing and homelessness crisis with the urgency it requires and looks forward to the day when our residents all have a safe place to call home.

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

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

BASIC CITY COUNCIL MEETING RULES

<u>AGENDAS</u> - The City Council meets Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 A.M. The agendas for City Council meetings contain a brief general description of those items to be considered at the meetings. Council Agendas are available in the Office of the City Clerk, Council and Public Services Division, Room 395, City Hall, 200 North Spring Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, and on the City's website at <u>lacity.gov</u> or <u>lacouncilcalendar.com</u>.

Ten (10) members of the Council constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Council may consider an item not listed on the agenda only if it is determined by a two-thirds (10) vote that the need for action arose after the posting of an Agenda. Some items on the agenda may be approved without any discussion, however, any item may be called "special" by a Councilmember. If an item is called "special" it will be "held" until the remainder of the items on the Council agenda have been acted on by the Council. An item may also be called "special" if a member of the public has requested to speak on the item and a public hearing was not previously held.

The City Clerk will announce the items to be considered by the Council, however items will be grouped. For example, all items for which required public hearings have not previously been held are listed in one section on the printed agenda. The Council President will ask if any Councilmember or member or the public wishes to speak on one or more of these items. If anyone wishes to speak on an item, it will be called "special". The remaining items in this section will be voted on by Council with one roll call vote.

<u>PUBLIC INPUT AT CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS</u> - An opportunity for the public to address the Council on agenda items for which public hearings have not been held will be provided at the time the item is considered or during the Multiple Agenda Item Comment period. Members of the public who wish to speak on items shall be allowed to speak for up to one minute per item up to a total of three minutes per meeting. The Council has determined that a cumulative total of 20 minutes is a reasonable minimum amount of time for the Multiple Agenda Item segment of each regular meeting.

The Council will also provide an opportunity for the public to speak on public interest items. Each speaker shall be limited to one minute of general public comment each regular meeting for a cumulative total of ten (10) minutes. The Council shall not discuss or take action relative to any general public comment.

If you wish to provide documents to the full Council for consideration on an item, please present the Sergeant-At-Arms with 35 copies. Otherwise, your materials will simply be added to the official record.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION AND TIME LIMITS - Councilmembers requesting to address the Council will be recognized by the Council President in the order requested. For any item, the Chairperson of the Committee, or the maker of the original motion, or the member calling a matter "special" shall have up to six (6) minutes to discuss the item. All other Councilmembers may speak up to three (3) minutes each on the matter. After all members desiring to speak on a question have had an opportunity to be heard once, the time for each Member desiring to speak again shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) minutes.

A motion calling the "previous question" may be introduced by any member during a Council debate. If adopted, this motion will terminate debate on a matter and the Chair will instruct the Clerk to call the roll on the matter.

<u>VOTING AND DISPOSITION OF ITEMS</u> - Most items require a majority vote of the entire membership of the Council (8 members). Items which have not been discussed in a Council Committee and have been placed directly on the agenda will require 10 votes to consider. Once considered, these items will normally require eight (8) affirmative votes to be adopted. Ordinances require a unanimous vote (at least 12 members must be present) in order to be adopted on first consideration. If

an ordinance does not receive the necessary unanimous vote, it is laid over one calendar week. The votes required for approval on second consideration vary and depend upon the type of ordinance, but a typical ordinance requires eight (8) affirmative votes upon second consideration.

NOTICE TO PAID REPRESENTATIVES - If you are compensated to monitor, attend, or speak at this meeting, City law may require you to register as a lobbyist and report your activity. See Los Angeles Municipal Code 48.01 et seq. More information is available at ethics.lacity.org/lobbying. For assistance, please contact the Ethics Commission at (213) 978-1960 or ethics.commission@lacity.org.

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When debate on an item is completed, the Chair will instruct the Clerk to "call the roll". Every member present must vote for or against each item; abstentions are not permitted. The Clerk will announce the votes on each item. Any member of Council may move to "reconsider" any vote on any item on the agenda, except to adjourn, suspend the Rules, or where an intervening event has deprived the Council of jurisdiction, providing that said member originally voted on the prevailing side of the item. The motion to "reconsider" shall only be in order once during the meeting, and once during the next regular meeting. The member requesting reconsideration shall identify for all members present the agenda number, Council file number and subject matter previously voted upon. A motion to reconsider is not debatable and shall require an affirmative vote of eight (8) members of the Council.

When the Council has failed by sufficient votes to approve or reject an item, and has not lost jurisdiction over the matter, or has not caused it to be continued beyond the next regular meeting, the item is continued to the next regular meeting for the purpose of allowing the Council to again vote on the matter.

The City Council rules provide that all items adopted by the Council will not be presented to the Mayor, or other designated officer by the City Clerk until the adjournment of the regular Council meeting following the date of the Council action. A motion to send an item "forthwith" if adopted by ten (10) votes, suspends these rules and requires the City Clerk to forward the matter to the Mayor, or other officer, without delay.

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RULE 16 MOTIONS - Council Rule No. 16, in part, allows a member to send an item directly to the Council without it having to go to a Council Committee first, by giving the City Clerk a motion (seconded by an additional member) during a Council session to be placed on the next regular available Council agenda.

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

Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

BASIC CITY COUNCIL MEETING RULES

<u>AGENDAS</u> - The City Council meets Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 A.M. The agendas for City Council meetings contain a brief general description of those items to be considered at the meetings. Council Agendas are available in the Office of the City Clerk, Council and Public Services Division, Room 395, City Hall, 200 North Spring Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, and on the City's website at lacity.gov or lacouncilcalendar.com.

Ten (10) members of the Council constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Council may consider an item not listed on the agenda only if it is determined by a two-thirds (10) vote that the need for action arose after the posting of an Agenda. Some items on the agenda may be approved without any discussion, however, any item may be called "special" by a Councilmember. If an item is called "special" it will be "held" until the remainder of the items on the Council agenda have been acted on by the Council. An item may also be called "special" if a member of the public has requested to speak on the item and a public hearing was not previously held.

The City Clerk will announce the items to be considered by the Council, however items will be grouped. For example, all items for which required public hearings have not previously been held are listed in one section on the printed agenda. The Council President will ask if any Councilmember or member or the public wishes to speak on one or more of these items. If anyone wishes to speak on an item, it will be called "special". The remaining items in this section will be voted on by Council with one roll call vote.

<u>PUBLIC INPUT AT CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS</u> - An opportunity for the public to address the Council on agenda items for which public hearings have not been held will be provided at the time the item is considered or during the Multiple Agenda Item Comment period. Members of the public who wish to speak on items shall be allowed to speak for up to one minute per item up to a total of three minutes per meeting. The Council has determined that a cumulative total of 20 minutes is a reasonable minimum amount of time for the Multiple Agenda Item segment of each regular meeting.

The Council will also provide an opportunity for the public to speak on public interest items. Each speaker shall be limited to one minute of general public comment each regular meeting for a cumulative total of ten (10) minutes. The Council shall not discuss or take action relative to any general public comment.

If you wish to provide documents to the full Council for consideration on an item, please present the Sergeant-At-Arms with 35 copies. Otherwise, your materials will simply be added to the official record.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION AND TIME LIMITS - Councilmembers requesting to address the Council will be recognized by the Council President in the order requested. For any item, the Chairperson of the Committee, or the maker of the original motion, or the member calling a matter "special" shall have up to six (6) minutes to discuss the item. All other Councilmembers may speak up to three (3) minutes each on the matter. After all members desiring to speak on a question have had an opportunity to be heard once, the time for each Member desiring to speak again shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) minutes.

A motion calling the "previous question" may be introduced by any member during a Council debate. If adopted, this motion will terminate debate on a matter and the Chair will instruct the Clerk to call the roll on the matter.

<u>VOTING AND DISPOSITION OF ITEMS</u> - Most items require a majority vote of the entire membership of the Council (8 members). Items which have not been discussed in a Council Committee and have been placed directly on the agenda will require 10 votes to consider. Once considered, these items will normally require eight (8) affirmative votes to be adopted. Ordinances require a unanimous vote (at least 12 members must be present) in order to be adopted on first consideration. If

CPRA-03a-Clerk-000400 Friday an ordinance does not receive the necessary unanimous vote, it is laid over one calendar week. The votes required for approval on second consideration vary and depend upon the type of ordinance, but a typical ordinance requires eight (8) affirmative votes upon second consideration.

NOTICE TO PAID REPRESENTATIVES - If you are compensated to monitor, attend, or speak at this meeting, City law may require you to register as a lobbyist and report your activity. See Los Angeles Municipal Code 48.01 et seq. More information is available at ethics.lacity.org/lobbying. For assistance, please contact the Ethics Commission at (213) 978-1960 or ethics.commission@lacity.org.

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When debate on an item is completed, the Chair will instruct the Clerk to "call the roll". Every member present must vote for or against each item; abstentions are not permitted. The Clerk will announce the votes on each item. Any member of Council may move to "reconsider" any vote on any item on the agenda, except to adjourn, suspend the Rules, or where an intervening event has deprived the Council of jurisdiction, providing that said member originally voted on the prevailing side of the item. The motion to "reconsider" shall only be in order once during the meeting, and once during the next regular meeting. The member requesting reconsideration shall identify for all members present the agenda number, Council file number and subject matter previously voted upon. A motion to reconsider is not debatable and shall require an affirmative vote of eight (8) members of the Council.

When the Council has failed by sufficient votes to approve or reject an item, and has not lost jurisdiction over the matter, or has not caused it to be continued beyond the next regular meeting, the item is continued to the next regular meeting for the purpose of allowing the Council to again vote on the matter.

The City Council rules provide that all items adopted by the Council will not be presented to the Mayor, or other designated officer by the City Clerk until the adjournment of the regular Council meeting following the date of the Council action. A motion to send an item "forthwith" if adopted by ten (10) votes, suspends these rules and requires the City Clerk to forward the matter to the Mayor, or other officer, without delay.

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RULE 16 MOTIONS - Council Rule No. 16, in part, allows a member to send an item directly to the Council without it having to go to a Council Committee first, by giving the City Clerk a motion (seconded by an additional member) during a Council session to be placed on the next regular available Council agenda.

<u>Fiscal Impact Statement:</u> The City Attorney reports that there is no general fund impact for accepting this grant program. The total project cost is \$2,000,000 and is fully reimbursed by grant funds received from the U.S. Department of Justice-Bureau of Justice Assistance.

The CAO reports that the total program cost of the Community-Based Violence Intervention and Prevention Initiative (CVIPI) Program is \$2 million and is fully reimbursed by the grant for salaries, related costs, contractual services, supplies and other travel and training expenses.

There is no General Fund impact, and the recommendations contained in the September 21, 2023 CAO report, attached to the Council file, are in compliance with the City's Financial Policies in that budgeted appropriations will be balanced against grant receipts expected from this grant.

<u>Financial Policies Statement:</u> The CAO reports that the City's Financial Policies require that the City pursue federal and state grants, but strictly limit financial support of these programs to avoid commitments that continue beyond available funding. The recommendations contained in the September 21, 2023 CAO report, attached to the Council file, comply with City Financial Policies in that the proposed funding is balanced against established revenue approved by Council actions and from federal and state grant receipts. All funding is subject to the availability of grant funds and determinations by Mayor and Council.
